



After math, we transition to our homerooms for community circle

What is community circle?

Into Reading Program



- Into Reading is a comprehensive literacy core program that was designed around the Science of Reading
- Students are provided with opportunities for direct instruction and guided practice in the areas of:
 - o foundational skills (phonemic awareness and phonics)
 - o fluency
 - vocabulary
 - comprehension





*Being a Writer program:

helps students develop their writing skills within a writing community. Students have the opportunity to select their topics of writing that align with our units. Students collaborate daily with a partner to help revise and edit.

Each day students will:

Have a 45 minute whole group reading lesson- the focus will be on comprehension, vocabulary and foundational skills.




Rotate through small group instruction and independent rotations.

During student's independent time, they will be working on building reading stamina, responding to their reading and drafting their stories.

Have a 30 minute whole group writing lesson.

Students will learn about fiction, expository, opinion and poetry writing.


Assessments in 4th Grade






